Hope and Holidays

As we look ahead to December, I am full of **hope**—this month's theme—for many wonderful opportunities to celebrate our UUC community.

Holidays bring on feelings of nostalgia, remembering traditional foods and festivities. As a child, I loved opening the little doors on our cardboard advent calendar to see the little picture surprises that culminated on Christmas morning. I loved making sugar cookies—cut out in holiday shapes and decorated with colored frosting and sprinkles—with my siblings. I loved helping my mother knead and roll out the dough for the tea rings she baked every year, and then tying holly on the silver, foil-wrapped packages to deliver to family and friends. I loved watching my favorite holiday shows, singing along with Rudolph, Clarisse, the snowman, the Whos of Whoville (not yet a reference to Charlottesville). I loved decorating the tree with colorful balls and the ornaments my grandmother had made. Everything was magic. What are your childhood memories?



As I got older, though, while some traditions remained, others changed. The holiday cartoons gave way to new favorites like *It's a Wonderful Life* and *A Christmas Story*. The holidays also became more hectic—rushing to finish all the shopping, attending different holiday gatherings, writing and sending cards, and packing and traveling long distances to be with far-away family. By the end of the month, I was exhausted. Somehow as a child, it seemed that all those holiday traditions just happened, but as an adult, they became more of a responsibility. And yet, when I saw the sparkle in a child's eye as they marveled at beautiful decorations or felt the warm embrace of greeting after a long day's travel, it was all worth it.

As we approach this month of holidays and holy days, I hope that we can find the right mix of the old and the new—savoring well-loved traditions and embracing new ways of celebrating. For the relative newcomers to this community, everything will seem new. And yet I hope we all find both the comfort of the familiar and excitement of novelty in this month's events—the holiday concert, the no-rehearsal pageant, our solstice celebration, and Christmas Eve service and potluck. I also hope that we can find the right balance of activity and rest, so that we enjoy whatever this month brings without feeling overwhelmed.



And as the days grow shorter and the air grows colder, let us be intentional in sowing and tending seeds of hope—in our own lives and in the larger community.

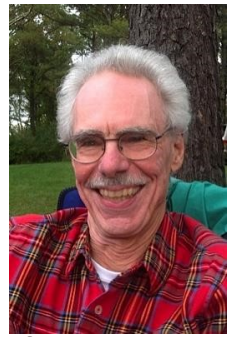

Message from Our President

Tim Pickering



It's a widely held view that the social climate in our country is not where we would like it to be. It makes us uneasy. It makes us worry about the future. We wonder what is wrong with "them", those who have different views about what is important than we do. One way I try to deal with such feelings is through meditation. A key goal of meditation is to recognize the thoughts that arise during meditation from the perspective of an observer rather than a participant. It's important not to judge the thoughts, just to notice them and let them "pass by". Did you know one can take the same approach with opinions? Here are some wise words on the subject from Pema Chodren in her book, *When Things Fall Apart*.

"One of the best practices for everyday living when we don't have much time for meditation is to notice our opinions... just as we notice that we're thinking when meditating. This is an extremely helpful practice because we have a lot of opinions, and we tend to take them as truth. But actually they aren't the truth. They are just our opinions... Just by this simple exercise we are introduced to the notion of egolessness. All ego really is, is our opinions, which we take to be solid, real, and the absolute truth about how things are. We can begin to recognize how easy it is to get into a war in which we want our opinions to win and someone else's to lose. It is especially tempting to do this when we're engaged in social action. This often results in aggressive feelings toward the "opponents"... When we hold on to our opinions with aggression, no matter how valid our cause, we are simply adding more aggression to the planet, and violence and pain increase. The way to stop the war is to stop hating the enemy. It seems to me a lot of the ill feeling in our country today arises from our negative opinions of "the other side". It makes us upset, but with no outlet for our feelings. Learning how to speak and act without aggression is an enormous challenge. The way to start is to begin to notice our opinions... If you find yourself becoming aggressive about your opinions, notice that. If you find yourself being nonaggressive, notice that. Cultivating a mind that does not grasp at right and wrong, you will find a fresh state of being. The ultimate cessation of suffering comes from that.

"As the Buddha taught, it's important to see suffering as suffering. We are not talking about ignoring or keeping quiet... If we don't get swept away by our outrage, then we will see the cause of suffering more clearly. That is how the cessation of suffering evolves."

I plan to give this approach a try and see if it will reduce my feelings of anxiety about our country's plight.

A few words about November's theme of *abundance*. Abundance can come in many flavors. We can have an abundance of woe as well as an abundance of joy. For example, our congregation has an abundance of mortgage debt. But we also have congregants who have an abundance of concern for our financial health. We have recently received two designated gifts, one of \$5,000 and one of \$2,000, to help pay down our mortgage debt. These gifts are greatly appreciated.

Joyous wishes to all for the holidays.

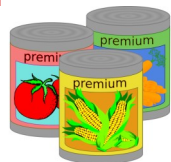


Adopt-A-Highway Litter Pickup

Support Group for Adult Children of Alcoholics

A new support group for Adult Children of Alcoholics (ACA) is holding its first meeting on Thursday, **December 7** at 7 PM and will meet weekly. This group is open to all in our local community so tell your friends who may benefit from participating.

ACA is a Twelve Step, Twelve Tradition program for adults who grew up in alcoholic or otherwise dysfunctional homes. The ACA program was founded on the belief that family dysfunction is a disease that infected us as children and affects us as adults. Our membership also includes adults from homes where alcohol or drugs were not present; however, abuse, neglect or unhealthy behavior was. We meet to share our experience and recovery in an atmosphere of mutual respect. We discover how alcoholism and other family dysfunction affected us in the past and how it influences us in the present. We begin to see the unhealthy elements of our childhood. This is a drop-in group for anyone who thinks they might benefit from attending.

Did you know that...

- ◆ Our mortgage principal balance is \$819,148 with an interest rate of 4.35%. Interest paid to date in calendar year 2017 is \$33,415. On January 1, 2010, the principal balance was \$980,000. We currently pay \$98/day in interest.
- ◆ We have \$48,000 in member loans with interest varying from 2.3% to 3.0%. Total interest on these loans for 2017 will be \$1,324.
- ◆ We just received two gifts totaling \$7,000 to pay down our mortgage principal. Special thanks to the generous donors!

Service Auction Recap

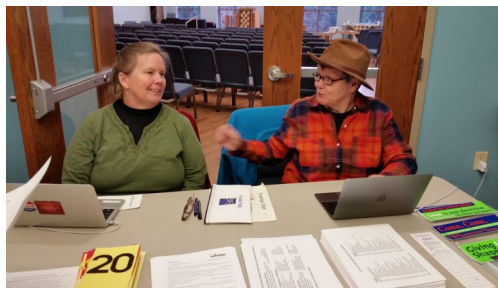
