## All About the Proposed Budget

March and April mark the beginning of spring and in the life of the UUC, they also mark the season where we prepare a budget that defines the financial needs for the coming fiscal year. We also provide an opportunity, through our Stewardship Ministry's Pledge Campaign, for members to pledge the financial offerings they will be able to contribute to support the work of the UUC during the next year.

### *Our Budget Process*

First, the Finance Committee gathers input from the staff, committee chairs, and leaders on what they propose to spend in the coming fiscal year. The Treasurer assembles all the input and uses judgement where input doesn't exist to present a candidate budget to the

Finance Committee and Board at their February meetings. The Board, using input from the Finance Committee, then approves a draft budget which determines what our pledge target needs to be for the stewardship campaign. The Stewardship Committee runs the pledge campaign during March and April to determine the amount of pledge income we can expect over the coming fiscal year. The Board, with the help of the Finance Committee, then works to fit the budget to the income that the congregation has told us, through your pledges, we can expect to receive. That budget gets presented for a vote at the Annual Congregational Meeting.

At their February meeting, the Board established a proposed 2026-2027 budget that will require \$422,000 in pledges to fully fund. Last year's campaign yielded pledges for our current fiscal year (2025-2026) totaling \$392,318. The Stewardship Ministry is asking for a 7.6% increase over last year to fully fund our 2026-2027 goals.

### *The increase will help us meet new goals.*

The increase in our budget proposal includes one aim we have been working toward for a few years: bringing staff pay up to the UUA guidelines for our geographic area. We've made great progress toward that goal, and as you can imagine, this is a moving target. We also are proposing to serve the larger UU denomination by bringing on our second ministerial intern. While we have saved some money toward paying an intern, this will still add a significant amount to our payroll in the coming year. We would also like to increase the LFD Assistant's time from 5 to 6 hours per week.

Other significant goals include rekeying our building and adding an electronic keypad for access rather than passing out keys. This will significantly increase

our building security and make it easier for everyone to utilize the building throughout the week. We will begin the process of replacing our wooden picnic tables with metal ones. We will also increase our Social Justice spending by expanding our Voting Rights and Anti-Racism funding and adding a line item in our budget for our active Defending Democracy ministry.

## Why submit a financial pledge?

Nearly all of the income UUC uses to fulfill our mission comes from the contributions of our members and friends. Your pledges directly impact what ministries we can offer, what causes we can support, how we can take care of each other, what staffing we are able to provide, and how we can maintain our building and grounds.

Before we can create a budget for the upcoming fiscal year, which begins July 1, we need to know how much income we can expect. During the annual pledge drive we ask that you make a pledge of support for the next fiscal year. No pledge is too small – every pledge helps – and your pledge should be the amount you can reasonably expect to be able to contribute in the coming year. If you are able to increase your pledge from last year, that is helpful. A pledge is your commitment, and we know that circumstances change. If you can't fulfill your pledge, you can request a waiver from the Minister or the Treasurer.

## How to Pledge

You can submit your pledge [online](#) anytime. Paper pledge cards are available in the lobby at UUC and will be on the tables at the Pledge Party Brunch on March 22. Our team of stewards will then contact those who have not yet pledged to discuss pledging and offer support.

After the pledge campaign ends, the UUC Board will reconcile the budget to the total amount pledged and will arrive at a budget to be voted on by the membership at our Annual Meeting in June.

## How to Fulfill your Pledge

Once you have submitted a pledge, please make a plan to fulfill it — in installments each week, month, year, or whatever works for you. The easiest way to pay in installments is to set up an automatic payment using your bank's bill-pay feature. This is usually offered for free from your bank! Your bank will mail a check to UUC. You can also use personal checks, cash, or pay online. Please note that payments made through our online giving service, Vanco, incur fees. These fees are paid by UUC unless you opt to pay them to benefit UUC. However you pay, please note each payment to indicate it is a pledge payment and for which fiscal year, e.g., "25-26 Pledge" or "26-27 Pledge". This helps us keep track of your contribution and credit you accordingly. Thank you!


## *Easter Service and Egg Hunt Sunday, April 5*

### **Meditation Group—Meets Tuesdays 5:00-6:00 PM**



Our next book will be *After the Good News: Progressive Faith Beyond Optimism*, by Nancy McDonald Ladd.




## *The UUA Common Read: “Social Change Now,” by Deepa Iyer*

Special shout-outs to Crosby Houston for staining all seven meditation benches, Joe Powers for winterizing the two lawn mowers, and to Susan and Bob Sisk for rehabbing and painting two of the picnic benches in the picnic area.

Speaking of the picnic tables, we hope to start replacing the wood tables with metal ones because the wood tables require “pesky upkeep”. We are always looking for ways to reduce maintenance work. “One table at a time as the budget allows” is our mantra.

Do you know the UUC grounds are just shy of 6 acres? The grounds highlight gardens, three beehives, fire circles, natural areas, a circular meditation path, a huge labyrinth, and much more. Take a discovery walk using the guidance of the in-ground, white brick way-finders and wood chipped paths.

The three beehives, managed by beekeeper Richard Reid, survived the brutal January temperatures. The bees keep the inside hive temperature of the winter bee cluster at 95 degrees by exercising muscles and expending energy. Windchill is the single most harmful factor resulting in bee deaths in cold climates. Richard leaves enough honey in the hives to provide winter food for the bees. Truly, bees are amazing creatures!

# VOTING RIGHTS TEAM



Four proposed VA Constitutional Amendments passed the General Assembly and will be on the ballot in 2026. One that will be on the ballot in a special election on April 21 is **the Mid-Decade Redistricting Amendment**. This allows Virginia to have a mid-decade redistricting allowable only if another state also has a mid-decade redistricting and allows this only until 2030 when VA would go back to once per decade redistricting. ## *Deadlines for Voting in April 21 special election:*

- Register to Vote/Update Registration: 4/14/2026
- Early in-person voting: 3/6/2026 through 4/18/2026
- Apply for ballot to be mailed to you: through 4/10/2026
- After April 14, voters may still register and vote using a provisional ballot in-person through April 21, 2026

## *The remaining 3 constitutional amendments will be on the ballot at the Nov. 3 general election:*

**Reproductive Freedom Amendment**– Guarantees the right for individuals to make their own decisions about the range of reproductive health including pre-natal care, childbirth, postpartum care, contraception, abortion care, miscarriage management and fertility care. Protects recipients and providers of reproductive healthcare. Stops government interference with personal healthcare decisions.

**Right to vote amendment** – Provides automatic restoration of voting rights to felons who have served their time, removing a 1902 Virginia Jim Crow era law.

**Marriage equality amendment** – Repeals Virginia's same-sex marriage prohibition.

## VOTING RIGHTS TEAM



### *Continued concern about Voter Suppression*

Two bills being considered by Congress will, if passed, disenfranchise 21 million American citizens and otherwise disrupt free and fair elections. The SAVE act (Safeguard American Voter Eligibility Act) has already passed the House of Representatives. The Senate will consider it soon. The MEGA (Make Elections Great Again) act goes even further. Both are based on the false claim that noncitizens register and vote.
