Why I like to take part in our annual pledge drive.... In a nutshell, or short version: It's a fact...well perhaps two facts: – 1. It has been life changing to be my whole self, earth worshipper, King James bible studier, homeless banquet guest, card-carrying member of the ACLU and NAACP, mood disordered, mentor and protegée, redeemed and unashamed, and to look around in any gathering and love everyone I see, especially those I may disagree with.

For me, it was a miracle finding the UUC. It is the first religious place where I've ever felt truly welcomed and valued, where I can be my whole self and be fully accepted. The friends and community I have at the UUC is something I never imagined finding.

Being part of UUC and attending weekly worship has filled my soul! Exploring what it means to live our lives in a spiritual community that is both challenging and affirming is the essential environment to explore the spirit well. Whether it is singing a favorite hymn together, holding silence as a congregation, or reflecting on the words of the sermon, worship - and UUC - makes me think more deeply and feel more richly.

I've found UUC, to be a '*Beloved Community'* --a '*Safe Harbor'-*where my spirit is replenished and grown. *Then* I went to UU General Assembly and thrilled to discover the great '*Sea'* of which our '*Safe Harbor'* is a part!

When I started attending UUC regularly 2 1/2 years ago, I had no idea how much my life would morph by being a part of this congregation: I found community, rediscovered my love of singing, and even got married here last fall. It makes the NRV my home, and my stewardship helps to sustain this community for years to come.

Raising open minded and spiritually aware children can be an overwhelming task. I am so grateful to the UUC for offering such varied rich content in a variety of formats. This content, plus all the efforts between RE, MSYG, YRUU, OWL and Parents' Covenant Group, to build the youth community provides them with a supportive cohort, encouraging attendance, learning and civic engagement.

I feel grateful that the UUC provided a wonderful refuge for my family, especially when my children were young, and take pride in claiming the UUC as my spiritual home.

I came in as hopeful skeptic searching for a spiritual home I was convinced didn't exist. A place where I might fit in and where my beliefs and questions wouldn't label me as an outsider. I found that spiritual home and much more besides. My family gained a community, my children gained a variety of perspectives. We have gained another family...one that pushes us to live better, love bigger, and to be the good we'd like to see in the world. My only regret is that we didn't find UUC sooner.

With work and a baby keeping us busy, it's great to have the UUC community for support and connection. We're also grateful to have a place for our child to have a religious education that will allow him to develop his own beliefs without judgement.

I love that RE gently encourages my kids to move out of their comfort zones, in terms of social interactions and with people of all ages. I also love that there's a community that cares about me and my family.

At one service we were asked to notice the people who had been with us during important moments in our lives. As a new member, I just sought out the face of my daughter, but then I also saw the realtor who helped my family find our first home, the midwife who welcomed me at the hospital when my daughter was born, and the gardener who, by entrusting me with her plants, let me know that I was part of her community. Members of the UUC had been welcoming me home for years before I even entered the doorway of the sanctuary. So glad I crossed that threshold. So glad to be home.

What we have to say about UUC: We Love It for Ourselves & the World

The seventeenth-century Puritan Roger Williams described himself as a Seeker: one who's doomed to keep looking for the true religion but knows he'll never find it. I'm with Williams, and in the meantime the best thing I can discover is the UUCNRV, which is pretty good.

Before I found UUC, my experience of adult life was often lonely. Now I feel rooted and purposeful. Honestly, I love the routine of church. But my favorite part of being a member of this congregation is that I have found people who genuinely care for me, for whom I can care, and with whom I can strive to serve and improve the world.

We are recommending a budget of **\$389,000** for the 2020-21 fiscal year with pledges accounting for **\$357,000** of income.





Creating Meaningful Worship (\$63,553, 16%)

We inspire spiritual and ethical growth, deepen our connections with others, and welcome newcomers through vibrant worship led by our minister, choir director, pianist, and lay leaders. Funds also pay for choir music, audio-visual system, and honoraria for guest ministers and musicians.

Educating Our Children, Youth, and Adults (\$83,622, 21%)

We believe faith development begins in early childhood and continues through adulthood, which is made possible by the leadership, creativity, and hard work of our Director of Lifespan Faith Development, Assistant DLFD, and many, many volunteers. Materials and supplies support Children's Religious Education, YRUU, Adult Religious Education, and Our Whole Lives.

Offering Congregational Care (\$73,377, 19%)

We create compassionate community by welcoming newcomers, communicating information, providing opportunities to gather together, and supporting each other during difficult times. The Connections Committee and Lay Pastoral Care Ministry are integral to taking care of the congregation, supported by the Administrator, who does a phenomenal job keeping us all informed, and the minister.

Promoting Social Justice & Community Outreach (\$25,416, 6%)

We strive to transform our community and world through courageous love, led by the Community Service Team which provides hands-on support for organizations working to address basic needs in our community and by the Environmental Justice Team which provides education and advocacy. Our minister and many congregants engage in many local justice activities.

Supporting our Wider Mission and Purpose (\$24,528, 6%)

We maintain our connection to the larger denomination through our dues to the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) and the Southern Region, magnifying our voice by joining it with all the other member congregations and receiving resources for religious education and congregational development. We also support our delegates to the UUA General Assembly by covering their registration, ensuring that we have a voice there.

Maintaining & Enhancing Our Building & Grounds (\$56,863, 15%)

We live into our vision of being "known as a place of beauty, welcome, joy, and celebration" by maintaining and enhancing our building and grounds and providing space for our own and community gatherings. We are grateful for the invaluable time and sweat equity of the many volunteers who steward our grounds and building.

Reducing Our Debt (\$61,667, 16%)

We invested in the expansion of our building and grounds over a decade ago, taking on a \$1.2M commitment in the form of a mortgage and personal loans from members. By the end of the 20-21 fiscal year, our debt will be down to \$760K. We are honoring our commitments but look forward to paying off our debt so we can invest more into our mission and vision.

Guide to Suggested Annual Pledge:

We know that pledging is a personal decision. To help you determine how much you might pledge, the chart below shows a range of suggested pledge amounts based on the adjusted gross income of your household and your commitment to the values and ideals we share. We hope you will reflect thoughtfully on what you can contribute to the future of our congregation.

Your pledge may be paid in weekly, monthly, quarterly or annual installments by check, automatic credit card or bank debit.
